This is also the number to use in school holidays if you are concerned about a child.



Introduction

"Everyone who works with children—including teachers, GPs, nurses, midwives, health visitors, early years professionals, youth workers, police, accident and Emergency staff, paediatricians, voluntary and community workers and social workers—has a responsibility for keeping them safe."

"If at any time it is considered that the child may be a child in need as defined in the Children Act 1989, or that the child has suffered significant harm or is likely to do so, a referral should be made immediately to local authority children's social care. This referral can be made by any professional."
